GENERAL RULES:

All FFA exhibitors must check with their Advisor to make sure they are on the FFA pass list by **BY July 6th** to be submitted to the Administration Office. FFA passes can be purchased at the Ticket Office exhibit window Tuesday, July 31, 10 am – 7 pm, Wednesday, August 1, 10 am - 7 pm and Thursday, August 2, 10 am - 9 pm, or at the Yellow Gate anytime during the Clark County Fair.

1. Exhibitors must read the General Rules document that also contains the General Animal Health Requirements, available on the Fair's website.
2. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE FFA DEPARTMENT BY THE LAST BUSINESS DAY OF JUNE. Mail entries to the Clark County Fair, 17402 N. E. Delfel Road, Ridgefield, WA 98642.
3. Livestock exhibits must be in place by 8 a.m., Friday, August 3 for Goats and Poultry or by 9 a.m., Wednesday, August 8 for Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Pigeons and Rabbits.
4. FFA Building exhibits must be in place by 8 p.m., Thursday, August 2 and are not released until 10 p.m. on Sunday, August 12.
5. Students must be registered FFA Members by the date of species weigh-in (for those showing livestock) or the last business day of June (for those showing only still exhibits).
6. All exhibits stalls must be cleaned before leaving the Clark County Fair.
7. A separate entry blank must be made for each department entered.
8. No FFA member may show entries of a general enterprise (dairy, market lambs, beef, Swine, poultry, etc.) in both 4-H and FFA divisions. If multiple animals are shown they must be designated as 4-H or FFA at time of pre-Fair weigh-in. They may show in open class if animals qualify.
9. Entry blanks, properly signed by parents and advisor, must be in the hands of the FFA Department by the last business day of June. Proof of ownership must be available on demand. All large species animals must be owned by members at least sixty (60) days prior to the opening of the Clark County Fair.
10. All FFA members showing livestock must enter the applicable showmanship class unless excused by the Director of the division.
11. All livestock entered may be used in the judging contests unless the owner receives exemption by the superintendent.
12. All livestock exhibits must be removed from the grounds by midnight of the closing day of the Clark County Fair. Any exhibits left overnight will be the responsibility of the exhibitor.

13. An individual may enter a maximum of two entries in any given class.
14. The Superintendent of the FFA division shall have the privilege of judging as to the fitness of any exhibit and may reject any entry not meeting quality requirements or failing to follow rules.
15. FFA Members are expected to wear official dress for sale pictures.
16. PREMIUMS SHALL BE FORFEITED UNLESS ALL RULES ARE FOLLOWED.
17. Please check the times for check-in and pick-up of entries carefully. Failure to abide by these times will result in forfeiture of your premiums.

CONSUMER PROTECTION:

To prevent exhibitors and guests from contracting any disease, and to set an example for attending public, exhibitors will not be allowed to eat or drink in the livestock barns. Keeping animals, stalls/pens, aisles and area clean are required. It is highly suggested that all exhibitors wash their hands on a regular basis. CCFA appreciates the cooperation of all participants in helping to deter the spread of disease.

The building superintendent will assign the landscape plots on Tuesday, July 3 in the display barn. Students can start to work on their display as soon as they have received their plot.

All landscapes shall be complete and ready for judging by 8 p.m. on Thursday, August 2.

All landscape entries must remain in place until 10 p.m. on Sunday, August 12 and be cleaned up by 7 p.m. on Monday, August 13, or arrangements made with the Superintendent.

Failure to clean up your landscape will result in your forfeiture of your premium.

Demonstration teams or individuals shall present their demonstration in the FFA building. One demonstration consists of a one-hour presentation. The material may be repeated one additional time on the same day, for a total of two hours of presentation time with premiums awarded for each hour. Each exhibitor (team or individual) is limited to four (4) demonstration presentations during the ten days of the Clark County Fair. Each demonstration topic can only be presented one time during the Clark County Fair. Demonstrations will be 10 am to 2 pm each day of the Fair.

The use of props or other educational aids is encouraged.

Demonstrations may be of any educational nature related to agriculture.

FFA HORTICULTURE

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All entries must be in the FFA building by 8 p.m. on Thursday, August 2, so that exhibits may be organized by the Superintendent. Any exceptions must be cleared with the superintendent so that exhibit space may be reserved. Exhibits must be tagged with exhibit tags that include the specific name of the entry. Individual student entries should be physically entered by the student owner. Exhibitors may enter only two entries in each class. Each horticultural variety is a different class. For example, green cabbage and purple cabbage are both considered cabbage but are in two different classes.

Exhibitors may have an early fair and/or late fair entries in Division 78, 79, 80, 81, 82 & 84. Early fair entries are due August 2 by 8 p.m. Late fair entries for these divisions are from Wednesday, August 8 at 10 a.m. and will remain on display until Sunday the August 12 at 10 p.m.

All entries will be monitored by the Superintendent and when they are no longer in quality condition they will be removed from display. Items are to be removed by the SUPERINTENDENT ONLY, not parents or FFA Members. If you feel that something needs to be removed, please let the Superintendent know.

DIVISION 78: FRUITS & NUTS

See "Notes" at beginning of Horticulture Section. Exhibitors may enter two exhibits in each Class. All Fruits and Nuts entries in a single exhibit should be of uniform size and maturity. Each exhibit should mostly fill, and be exhibited on, a standard paper plate.

Exhibitors can enter in 1st half of fair show and 2nd half of fair show.

POINTS AWARDED: Blue 8; Red 6; White 4

CLASS: 1 Pome fruits (apples, pears, etc.) - exhibit three of same variety

CLASS: 2 Drupes (soft or stone fruits) - three of same variety

CLASS: 3 Berries (any variety, no blackberries) - exhibit in one cup container

CLASS: 4 Nuts, any variety - exhibit in two-pound container

CLASS: 5 Other fruit – exhibit three of same variety

DIVISION 79: GARDEN VEGETABLES

POINTS AWARDED: Blue, 8; Red, 6; White, 4

See "Notes" at beginning of Horticulture Section. Exhibitors may enter ten exhibits in this Division. All entries in a single exhibit should be uniform in size and maturity. Each exhibit should mostly fill, and be exhibited on, a standard paper plate.

Exhibitors can enter in 1st half of fair show and 2nd half of fair show.

CLASS: 1 Solanaceae (peppers, tomatoes, potatoes, etc.)five of same variety

CLASS: 2 Liliaceat (onion, asparagus, garlic, etc.)five of same variety

CLASS: 3 Graminae (sweet corn, popcorn, etc.)five of same variety

CLASS: 5 Umbelliferae (carrots, celery, parsnips, etc.)five of same variety

All sheafs of grain, hay and forage must be in bundles and tied securely. Sheafs of grain or forage crops should be four inches in diameter. Slices of baled hay must be no less than five inches thick.

DIVISION 81: PRODUCTION BLOCKS

PREMIUMS: Blue, \$25; Red, \$15; White, \$5

A horticulture production block shall consist of 12 plants of one species. Judging will be based on uniformity as well as individual quality.

The horticulture superintendent will assign display areas for the production blocks. Each production block must include an informational sign with the following information: name of chapter or individual, species of plant, age of plants and method of propagation.

Entries must be physically entered by the individual exhibitor through the horticulture superintendent. Each block entered by an exhibitor must be of a different species. Each exhibitor may only enter two production blocks. A chapter may enter blocks as an exhibitor by following the same rules above.

DIVISION 82: CUT FLOWERS

See Notes above

POINTS AWARDED: Blue 8, Red 6, White 4

Flowers exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor. Flowers must carry their own foliage. Each entry tag must include the species.

Only two entries per class are allowed per exhibitor. In cut flowers, each color may be considered a separate class. List color if entering more than two items in a class letter.

Single blooms over three inches in diameter or sprays should be shown one per vase. Blooms under three inches in diameter should be shown three blooms per vase. Exceptions may be made for specialty flowers.

See "**Notes**" at beginning of Horticulture Section. Exhibitors may enter ten exhibits in Cut Flower Section.

Exhibitors may exhibit during the 1st half of the fair show and during the 2nd half of the fair show.

FFA projects may be in any area of Agriculture studies. Examples would include Natural Resources, Animal Science, Horticulture, Mechanics, Agri-business, Agri-science, Science Poster, Natural Resource poster. Boards should display samples, specimens, photos, materials or equipment. Minimum poster/board size is 11 by 17 inches and maximum size is 36 by 36 inches. They may involve an activity for the viewer.

STUART C. WOODSIDE MEMORIAL TROPHY:

This trophy is given in honor of Stuart C. Woodside, the dairyman who was chairman of the initial Heifer Replacement Program at the Clark County Fair in 1977. Mr. Woodside worked long and hard to make this a program where 4-H and FFA members could acquire heifers and sell them back to dairy farmers as replacement animals. The first selection of heifers was at the 1977 Fair and the first sale was on August 10, 1979. Prior to this time, 4-H and FFA members who raised quality heifers did not have a place to sell them. This has allowed members from small farms the opportunity to have the joy and experience of raising an animal. This award is based on the job the member has done within the following four categories:

- Breeding the heifer to freshen at the right time.
- Having the heifer in the appropriate condition for entrance into the milking string.
- Presentation of the heifer in the ring.
- Knowledge of the breeding and pedigree of the heifer.

THE JOHN SOUDERS INSPIRATION AWARD:

Participation in the Junior Livestock Auction

Participating in the Junior Livestock Auction is an option (not a requirement) for youth in the 4-H and FFA programs. All animals sold at the Junior Livestock Auction shall have passed the withdrawal period for administration for medicines, whether under veterinary care or not. It is the responsibility of each market animal exhibitor to insure compliance with this rule. This rule exists for public health reasons. Violators are subject to disqualification of all prizes, awards and premiums with potential suspension from 4-H activities for a period determined by the Clark County Fair 4-H Grievance committee and potential civil or criminal legal action.

MARKET STEERS/HEIFERS:

To qualify for the sale, steers and heifers must weigh at least 500 pounds at pre-weigh-in on February 3, 2018 and 1000 pounds at the final weigh-in, August 8, 2018 at 7 am. They must grade select or better, weigh 1000 pounds or more, have a rate of gain totaling 463 pounds and have competed and been placed in the market beef class. A person is limited to weighing in three (3) animals at pre-weigh-in, but limited to selling and weighing in two (2) animals for the sale.

Each FFA/4-H member showing in this department is responsible for reading and complying with the **General Rules** for the Clark County Fair, the FFA/4-H rules (located at the beginning of Exhibitors Handbook) and any regulations printed at the beginning of this section, and the special rules and regulations of this department. (The Clark County Fair General Rules and the 4-H General Rules documents are available on the Clark County Fair's website.)

All 4-H Goats are to be in place by 8 am Friday, August 3 and removed beginning at 8 pm Tuesday, August 7 (except for those animals entered in the Open Class Show). Market Goats are to be checked in by 9 am Wednesday, August 8 and will stay through Sunday, August 12.

RULES & REGULATIONS:

Breaking any of the following rules may result in your dismissal by the superintendent from the show and/or forfeiture of all awards.

1. 4-H leaders and FFA exhibitors must call the superintendent by June 30 with exhibitor and animal numbers. Pen space will be EXTREMELY limited and assigned on a formula basis by the superintendent. Failure to meet deadlines may result in not being able to show in this project.
2. Each exhibitor will be limited to a total of 10 animals, OR LESS, as space dictates.
3. Fitting and showing is not an option. Participation in the Junior Livestock Auction with a Market Animal Goat requires showmanship with an on-going main project animal. An exhibitor must compete in fitting and showing division to be eligible for any type division unless the animal is under veterinary care and unable to compete.
4. All animals must be dehorned, disbudded, or naturally polled.
5. There will be no intact males permitted in the barn. (Except for kids 0-3 months). If any small intact male exhibits any "bucky" behavior, they will be required to leave.
6. Animals must be health checked before entering goat barn.
7. American Dairy Goat Association rules shall govern for the Dairy Goat Show. This will be a combined Junior/Senior Doe show, NOT a separately sanctioned show. Pygmy goats will not be shown during the ADGA Dairy Goat Show.
8. No borrowing will be allowed for group divisions.
9. Any animal shown in a group division must have been shown in individual divisions.
10. There will be no limit (except as provided in Rule 2) on entries in individual divisions. There will be a limit of two entries per exhibitor for group division, except Dairy Herd or Best Three, which are limited to one entry per exhibitor.

11. There will be no clipping in the aisles or doorways. Milking will be done in designated areas or tack areas.
12. Members should have completed or be currently enrolled in a 4-H goat project. Each exhibitor is expected to have access to one or more animals. Lend-lease agreement is permissible if the member takes care of the animal. This means a member may borrow, rent, or lease an animal for a project. The animal must be acquired and cared for by the exhibitor for a minimum of 60 days before the date of the show. If a member's project animal dies or is incapacitated, it is permissible to use another animal in a show if written approval is given by two (2) club leaders or parents not related to the member and further approved by the superintendent. A youth may be a 4-H goat project member without having access to an animal for the purpose of learning about the project.
13. No loud radios/TV/stereos allowed in exhibit area.
14. All animals must be fed and watered on a regular basis and as needed on hot days. Water buckets shall be kept full and clean. Hay fed in appropriate feeders and kept filled for display.
15. No animals will be left unattended at wash rack/show ring.
16. Exhibitors must walk and control all animals at all times when outside of pens.
17. Adults, leaders and other non 4-H members may help in early morning clean-up of the pen area prior to 8 am.
18. All animals in lactation must be milked a minimum of 2X per day on a regular schedule. The exceptions being a nursing doe or show day when animals may be bagged for show by varying the milking time.
19. All exhibitors must participate in Herdsmanship. Failure to do so will mean a loss of premiums. Herdsmen must be neatly dressed and have an identifying badge, vest shirt, hat, etc. appropriate to their 4-H club when they are on duty.
20. Exhibitor's attire should be neat and clean. No tank/halter/low cut tops, no cropped shorts, and no bare feet. Show ring requirements - Dairy -White shirt/blouse, white pants/jeans/long skirt. Pygmy and Boer - White shirt/blouse, black pants/jeans/long skirt. All breeds - Boots or sturdy shoes, no open toes or sandals.
21. 4-H goat exhibitors may assist each other in fitting and clipping animals for all type classes. Animals that will be used for a fitting and showing contest **must** be clipped or fitted by the exhibitor. No adult assistance is allowed unless a safety issue is warranted. In classes where exhibitors have more than one entry, other 4-H exhibitors may assist them in the show ring.
22. No one is allowed to coach contestants while they are in the show ring. The show ring is off limits to everyone except contestants and working show personnel unless a safety factor is warranted. The judge should not be approached by anyone until judging is completed and judges should not interact with spectators of any show or exhibit excepting 4-H show assistants during the active progression of a show or exhibit. The superintendent or assistant superintendent will reserve the right to dismiss any exhibitor from any 4-H class or show for any misconduct or infraction of the Clark County Fair and 4-H General Rules. They will forfeit all awards received at the show and/or in the division.

The Market Animal Goat project requires ongoing main project animal/animals and participation in fitting and showing of that breed. Minimum weight allowed for the Market Goat class is **65 pounds**. Animals of any breed born January 1, 2018 or after are allowed. However, rate of gain will favor animals born in late winter or early spring. Qualifying rate of gain will be a minimum 0.3 pounds per day from the date of first weigh-in in June until the final weigh-in at the Fair. Animals must be de-horned and males castrated by weigh-in on Saturday, June 2, 2018. Method of castration is surgical removal or banding only. Goats will be graded on weight, muscle tone, and overall condition.

Market Animal Goat certificates must be turned in to the WSU/Clark County Extension Office by April 1, 2018.

Two certificates can be turned in. Goats must be ear tagged and weighed on Saturday, June 2, 2018 at the Clark County Event Center at the Fairgrounds at 8 am. Up to two animals can be weighed per exhibitor and entered in the Clark County Fair. Only blue ribbon animals will be included in the Junior Livestock Auction, which will take place Saturday, August 11, 2018.

All market goats not making minimum weight or Rate of Gain will show in Lot B: Feeder Market Goat.

CLASS:

A. Single Market Goat, having made minimum weight of 65 pounds and Rate of Gain of 0.3 pounds per day from the date of first weigh-in until final weigh-in at fair.

B. Single Feeder Market Goat

Market goats will be divided, at the discretion of the Judge, into the following three weight Divisions.

- Lightweight
- Middleweight
- Heavy weight
- Champion and Reserve Champion from each weight division will compete for overall Grand and Reserve Grand Champion.

C. Home Grown Goat

This lot is for goats bred and owned by the exhibitor that have competed in Division 368, Classes A and B. Doe must be owned by exhibitor prior to breeding. Offspring must be born on exhibitor premises. Entries must be substantiated by member's current record book. Champion and Reserve Champion

Market animals will be presented for judging in a clean and show-shaved condition. No market animal identification tag shall be tampered with or removed for any reason without the express written approval of the Goat 4-H superintendent, the chairperson of the Clark County Fair Junior Livestock Auction committee and the county 4-H Regional Specialist.

- GROUP 1: MARKET READY: USDA Prime or Choice quality with greater conformation and/or cut ability BLUE RIBBON
GROUP 2: MARKET READY: USDA Good quality with average conformation and/or cut ability RED RIBBON
GROUP 3: NOT MARKET READY: Under finished goat grading USDA below average conformation and/or cut ability WHITE RIBBON

Participation in the Junior Livestock Auction

Participating in the Junior Livestock Auction is an option (not a requirement) for youth in the 4-H and FFA programs. All animals sold at the Junior Livestock Auction shall have passed the withdrawal period for administration for medicines, whether under veterinary care or not. It is the responsibility of each market animal exhibitor to insure compliance with this rule. This rule exists for public health reasons. Violators are subject to disqualification of all prizes, awards and premiums with potential suspension from 4-H activities for a period determined by the Clark County Fair 4-H Grievance committee and potential civil or criminal legal action.

All market animal goats presented in the Market Animal goat classes and the Junior Livestock Auction shall have been final weighed at the commencement of the 4-H portion as arranged by the goat superintendent and the Junior Livestock Auction committee chairperson. A Market Animal may not be substituted after the official Junior Livestock Association pre weigh-in (first Saturday in June). Dress code for the Junior Livestock Auction will be the same as described under fitting and showmanship. If Junior Livestock Auction T-shirts are provided, they are to be worn by participants in the sale instead of the white shirt/blouse.

To qualify for the sale, a goat must be a minimum of 65 pounds and born after January 1, 2018. Qualifying rate of gain will be a minimum of 0.3 pounds per day from date of first weigh-in in June until the final weigh-in at Fair. An exhibitor may weigh-in and tag two (2) animals at the June 2, 2018 pre weigh-in, but only one (1) animal will be allowed to be sold at the sale.

Qualifying rate of gain will be a minimum of .3 pounds per day for a total minimum of 21 pounds gained.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

Each 4-H member showing in this department is responsible for reading and complying with the general rules for the Clark County Fair located at the front of Exhibitor Handbook, the 4-H rules and regulations printed at the beginning of the 4-H section, and the special rules and regulations of this department. Any 4-H member showing in this department has the right to show or use in fitting and showing any domestic fowl as long as it is healthy, clean, and not in molt. However, the judging of the birds themselves will be done to the American Poultry Association and American Bantam Association Standards. Their disqualification rules will be applied to the birds. The superintendent has a copy of these rules for the members to see if necessary.

Exceptions are:

1. The crossbred class, which, if they are without other disqualifications, will be judged on condition and cleanliness only.
2. The meat and egg laying classes will be judged by market considerations.

POULTRY RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. Entries must be received by the last business day of June to the WSU/Clark County Extension – 4-H Program office.
2. In filling out your entry form, please state name, mailing address and a phone number where you can be reached in case of emergency.
3. Under "Name, Variety" list each bird's breed and variety.

All blue ribbon animals are eligible for the JLA; however, only two lots are eligible to go through the Junior Livestock Auction.

Poultry singles and pens have no pre weigh-in, but are weighed just before being shown. Birds must have a wing band (leg bands for geese and turkeys) with number on record and a mandatory feed record sheet. All blue ribbon singles and pens of chickens, ducks, geese, and

turkeys are eligible for sale. Attendance at one of the two quality assurance meetings is mandatory for selling in the JLA.

Poultry weigh-in will begin 8 am, August 8. Birds will not be accepted before scheduled weigh-in time. Judging standings are determined by weight, vitality, and market requirements. Judge's decision is final. Each youth selling poultry in the JLA is required to do two hours of herdsmanship per day.

Market Chicken: Single and Market Pen (3 birds). To qualify must be at least eight weeks old on August 8, 2018 and weigh at least five pounds but not more than seven pounds. Each chicken must be wing banded at two weeks of age and rebanded at four weeks of age, if necessary.

Market Duck: Single and Market Pen (3 birds). To qualify must be at least eight weeks old on August 8, 2018 and weigh at least six pounds but no more than eight pounds. Each duck must be wing banded at two weeks of age and rebanded at four weeks of age, if necessary.

2. 4-H members showing in the Rabbit Project must select one of the following options:
 - A. Enter a record book in Class 010 and compete for both ribbons & premiums. OR
 - B. Submit the completed Rabbit Project add sheets from the record book (C0832 – <http://ext100.wsu.edu/clark/4hyouthfamilies/recordbooks/>) to the Rabbit Superintendent upon check-in, and compete for ribbons & premiums. OR
 - C. In the absence of a Record Book, compete for ribbons only. Exhibitors choosing this option will not receive premiums.
3. Eligibility to compete for the 4-H Lucky Rabbit's Foot award are as follows:
 - A. Enter a record book in Division 010.
 - B. Enter an Educational poster in Division 030.
 - C. Enter at least one rabbit in the Rabbit Breed and Variety Show.
 - D. Must compete in Showmanship Division 474.
 - E. Must compete in the Judging Contest Division 472.
4. Rabbits to be exhibited with the exception of Market and Commercial Pre-Juniors shall be at least 12 weeks old. Market and Commercial Pre-Juniors shall be less than 10 weeks old.

Participation in the Junior Livestock Auction

Participation in the Junior Livestock Auction is an option (not a requirement) for youth in the 4-H and FFA programs. All Animals sold at the Junior Livestock Auction shall have passed the withdrawal period for administration for medicines, whether under veterinary care or not. It is the responsibility of each market animal exhibitor to insure compliance with this rule. This rule exists for public health reasons. Violators are subject to disqualification of all prizes, awards, and premiums with potential suspension from 4-H activities for a period determined by the Clark County Fair 4-H Grievance committee and potential civil or criminal legal action.
